#### ORGANISATION AND MANAGEMENT THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS

The Board of Governors has overall responsibility for the effective management of the school. The Board of Governors of St Mary's Primary School consists of nine voting members plus the Principal of the School who is a non-voting member.

The Board of Governors was responsible for the implementation of the curriculum, for making recommendations for the appointment of staff, pupil admissions, discipline, school premises and finance. Governors attend regular meetings of the School's Governing Body – at least one per term – and any extra, special meetings that might be required to deal with urgent business as it arises. They show an interest in all school activities and keep themselves informed about education in general. Governors are also invited to attend the necessary training provided by the Education Authority.

Elected representatives hold office for four years. These elections were in accordance with the CCMS, Scheme of Management for Catholic Maintained Schools.

The day-to-day running of the school has been delegated to the Principal of the school.

A School Leadership Team consisting of the Principal, a newly appointed Senior teacher and SENCO, provided a framework for the management of the school. Two staff members have additional points of

responsibility. Two teachers successfully within the school successful completed their Senior Leadership Pathway Programme in the year 2018/19.

Subject Co-ordinators had specific responsibilities relating to curricular areas and ensured that the curriculum was delivered to your child in as meaningful a context as possible, while at the same time attending to pastoral, administrative and managerial duties. These responsibilities were continually reviewed in light of changing circumstances.

These organisational structures within the school strengthen the school's ability to manage changes arising from Government Policy and to respond appropriately to them.

#### THE CURRICULUM

When we speak of the Curriculum at St. Mary's we are referring to the learning experiences afforded to each child within the school. These learning experiences include those planned by the staff and those gained from our school ethos and environment.

We recognise the uniqueness of each individual child and plan to provide for his/her needs accordingly. The Primary phase comprises three areas namely:

- Foundation Stage: Primary One and Two
- Key stage 1: Primary Three and Four
- Key stage 2: Primary Five, Six and Seven

The curriculum covers six areas of study:

Language and Literacy (Including Talking & Listening, Reading & Writing)

Mathematics & Numeracy

The Arts (Including Art & Design, Drama & Music)

The World Around Us (WAU)

Personal Development and Mutual Understanding

Physical Education

Religious Education is taught as a separate subject although the opportunities for cross curricular work are many and varied especially in relation to the Arts, The World Around Us, PDMU and Literacy.

At the heart of the curriculum lies an explicit emphasis on the development of skills and capabilities for lifelong learning and for operating effectively in society. Through opportunities to engage in active learning contacts across all areas of the curriculum, children in St. Mary's progressively develop.

All schools are legally required to formulate a SDP which details the schools priorities for a three year period. The school year 2018/19 was the first year of the implementation of this plan.

Detailed Action Plans, required to bring about improvement and raise standards within the school curriculum and provision were drawn up and ratified by Governors. These Action Plans determined the extensive curriculum development programme and staff training for the year ahead.

## **LITERACY & NUMERACY**

The literacy focus for the 2018/19 school year was to develop Shared Reading and continue to the use of authorial tecniques. In numeracy the focus was to develop the Measures and Number strand with a specific focus on time & money.

A comprehensive training programme for staff on the development of Active Learning, Shared Reading, Measures and Numeracy was rolled out.

Alongside implementing the strategies and gathering evidence, staff also engaged in training on a variety of iPad apps, to support and enhance the teaching and learning in Literacy and Numeracy.

A yearly overview and half term plans for Literacy and Numeracy have been further refined to appropriately meet the variety of needs within the composite classes. Detailed fortnightly planning for both literacy and numeracy have been implemented and rigorously monitored.

Parental workshops were provided and a reduction in underachievement in both literacy and numeracy has been achieved.

We celebrated Roald Dahl day in September. The children came to school dressed as a character from their favourite book. The Scholastic Book Fair took place in October 2018 and we managed to raise a magnificent £660.00. World Book Day was celebrated in March 2019. This year saw the 2<sup>nd</sup> Year of the St. Mary's Speech Festival on the 5th May. Children from PI-P7 were provided with a range of poems and had to deliver them to the adjudicator Mrs Fitzpatrick. Parents were invited to attend and it was a very successful event. The children participated with enthusiasm and were truly a credit to their parents and their school.

# **ICT**

This year saw St Mary's secure a partnership with Nerve Belfast for the next academic year. The Digital Leader Programme was further embedded into the school life and pupils from P4 - P7 were appointed as Digital Leaders. Pupils continued to develop their awareness of Internet Safety and the Digital Leaders launched 'Smart Shark' the school online safety mascot which they created in collaboration with staff from the Apple Store, Belfast. All pupils developed their online collaboration skills by using the C2K NewsDesk programme as an introduction to communicating with a wider audience. A partnership was established with staff from St Patrick's Grammar, Downpatrick on the use of Google Classroom and Google Education. Pupils in Key Stage 2 participated in Google Forms activities created by their teacher.

# **SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS' PROVISION**

Provision for pupils with learning needs was on-going in 2018-19. Children with learning difficulties were identified at an early stage and were supported by our Learning Support Teacher and Classroom Assistants. This support involved both withdrawal in small or individual group teaching and differentiated activities within the classroom. Pupils with learning needs were identified, assessed and an individual or group plan was drawn up with the teacher and SENCO (Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator) to work with these children to meet their needs. These learning needs included the areas of Literacy, Numeracy and Social Emotional and Behaviour issues. We continued to use child friendly Individual Education Plan's (IEP) to ensure pupil input to targets.

Since September, we consulted about 2 pupils. One of these pupils has received a Proposed Statement. The other pupil is undergoing a Statutory Assessment of their Educational Needs. The pupil who was home –schooled has since returned to school. Four parents in total have submitted parental requests for Statutory Assessment to the EA. 2 of these have been declined. I was granted and I is ongoing. One child is receiving support from Longstone Behaviour. Two children remain on the waiting list for the Longstone Behaviour service. 3 pupil referrals have been made to the EA Behaviour Support Service. I of these pupils was observed by Behaviour Support and there has been ongoing contact to meet this child's needs. This child will be reviewed in September. One child is receiving support from the EA literacy support team. I I pupils are participating in the Nessy Reading and Writing Programme. I child with a Statement is known to EWO due to attendance issues arising from his SEN and this is ongoing.

All teaching and ancillary staff have received Nurture training and we are receiving outreach support from EA for a whole school approach to nurture which is ongoing. Teachers continue to use Dyselxia Checklist/ strategies to identify children showing concerns. Application for BDA Quality Mark for Dyslexia was put on hold due to financial restraints. The school used the Dyslexia Screening Tool and the Nessy Reading and Writing Programme to identify and support pupils with some literacy difficulties. This is ongoing. We celebrated Dyslexia Awareness Day by 'Going Green for Dyslexia'.

The SENCO has met with the parents of 5 children with a statement to complete the annual review process.

Our school was named in the ETI Publication 'Report of a survey of Special Educational Needs in mainstream schools' in recognition of having highly effective provision for pupils with SEN

#### RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AND RECEPTION OF THE SACRAMENTS IN ST MARY'S.

This year the P7 children were introduced to the new Grow in Love Religious programme.

Father Brendan Smyth our school chaplin and Father Sean Rogan regularly visited school to support and promote the development of our faith for pupils, parents and staff.

Parents and grandparents attended a variety of class and whole school assemblies and prayer services.

The beginning of year school Mass was celebrated on 27th September.

All P4-7 children received the sacrament of reconciliation for Christmas and Easter respectively.

The P7 children took part in the Service of Light on the 8<sup>th</sup> March.

The P3 children received the Sacrament of First Penance on 21st March in St.Mary's Church.

Primary 7 children from the school received the Sacrament of Confirmation on I<sup>st</sup> April in St Mary's Church.

First Holy Communion Day was celebrated on Saturday 13<sup>th</sup> April in St. Mary's Church and was another very special occasion, thoroughly enjoyed by those present.

The Primary 7 children lead the 50<sup>th</sup> Year Celebration Mass on the 5<sup>th</sup> June, it was a truly memorable occasion as we celebrated the journey of St. Mary's Primary School, over the last 50 years.

As always our school choir sang at each of these very special occasions to make it a whole school celebration.

#### **CHARITIES**

During the year St.Mary's supported, St.Vincent de Paul, Macmillian Cancer, Action Cancer and Trocaire. In conjunction with the Parish of Killyleagh & Kilmore we also participated in the Blythswood Shoe Box Appeal 2018.

# **THE WORLD AROUND US**

WAU planning was reviewed and developed through out the year. An overview was implemented were each teacher identified the strands, what aspects of history, geography, science and STEM are to be covered within each topic. Science was a key focus area within planning and each teacher highlighted key areas within the science progression grid to ensure there is a clear progression of teaching and learning within the area of science and that all key areas are being covered within the two year cycle. There is clear evidence of science experiments being incorporated into planning. Educational visits and invited guests continue to be used to enhance learning within WAU. In September 2018 the school was awarded their first Green Flag as part of the Eco Schools award. The Eco Council also planned, developed and carried out many in class and whole school activities to achieve the Silver Sustran Award.

# **THE ARTS (MUSIC & DRAMA)**

Children in St.Mary's were involved in music and drama activities through a range of productions last year. For our Christmas concerts PI-4 were brilliant in their musical play Santa's Setbacks. The P4's- P7 production of Hoodwinked demonstrated a wealth of talent within the school. Children from PI to 7 were involved in singing and performing at class assemblies over the course of the year.

Every child once again took part in our Grandparents day celebration at the end of January.

Our School Choir were involved in many musical events and various liturgical occasions including our School Mass, Christmas lights festivities in Killyleagh, Catholic Schools' Week, our Open Day, First Confession and First Holy Communion.

The KS2 children participated in a workshop provided by Knoglux Theatre on the issue of staying safe online.

Our school year closed with the P7 production of Summer Holiday! It was a fabulous show and the children were truly amazing!

#### **HEALTH EDUCATION**

The academic year of 2018-2019 saw the launch of the Well-Being group, pupils from P4-P7 were asked to become involved with raising the profile of this group. Parents were invited in to a talk provided by Community Advice on managing money and dealing with current changes affecting benefits. Pamper session for Mums, Grans, Aunties and Sisters hosted by Year 2 Beauty Students, SERC Downpatrick. Family Fitness After School Session run by Jenny Finnegan.

All pupils participated in PDMU lessons that focused on the development of their health. The Daily Mile iniative has had a positive affect on both physical health but also on pupil well being and continues to be imbedded in St Mary's.

Our Breakfast Club ran each morning to provide a healthy start to the day. This was well attended with approximately 50 children attending each week.

Children were encouraged to drink water during the school day and parents supported guidance on providing no fizzy or sugary drinks.

The whole school participated in the Sustran Programme and we were delighted to receive the Silver Award this year.

Our Extended School activities encouraged and promoted healthy lifestyles.

#### ASSESSMENT AND REPORTING

All staff engaged in the analysis of data, to identify low achievement, possible underachievement and to highlight children who were performing above their expected attainment.

Using this data staff were then guided through the task of setting realistic yet challenging targets.

PTM and PTE Standardised assessment in the areas of Mathematics and English were carried out from P3 to P7 in May/June 2018. All children from P2-P7 completed Standardised Spelling Test. In addition a Cognitive Assessment Tool (CAT) was carried out on all children in P3-P7.

The correlation of these results have been used to identify strengths and areas of weakness at whole school, class and individual pupil level. Realistic but challenging targets for the future academic year have been set.

Test results are recorded for each child enabling progress to be tracked via the SIMS software.

Additional assessments are carried out by the Learning Support Teacher and teachers assess children in their classes on a regular basis to inform planning.

On-going assessment of teaching and learning is an integral part of St.Mary's approach and children are encouraged to evaluate and reflect on their own learning. Varieties of approaches recommended by Assessment for Learning are used throughout the classes, encouraging self and peer assessment. Pupils were assessed using the levels of Progression for Communication, Using Mathematics and Using ICT. P4 and P7 were assessed with reference to the levels in Communication and Using Mathematics and these results were reported to parents in June 2019.

# **SPORTING AND EX-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES IN ST MARY'S**

#### **Swimming**

The children from P5 – P7 attended swimming lessons at Downpatrick Leisure Centre. The children were led by qualified swimming coaches. All children participated readily in this activity and excellent progress has been made across the four year groups with all children receiving an award – Well Done!

# <u>Soccer</u>

This year saw the further development of the soccer club in St. Mary's PS under the coaching expertise of Mr Sharvin. We have also developed a partnership with the IFA Grassroot team from Newry & Mourne Council. Weekly after school training sessions saw the promotion and development of some fine skills and qualities.

#### **Gaelic Coaching**

2018/19 saw the coaching of Gaelic skills for children from P3-P7 offered by Down County Board.

#### **Netball Coaching**

The KS2 children were coached by Mrs Rice during the 3<sup>rd</sup> terms. Our school hosted a very successful netball tournament and five other schools attended.

# **Sports Day**

We had another successful Sports day on 6th June. The weather was perfect which helped make the day an enjoyable one for everyone. Many children received medals for achieving first and second place and all children received a special award for their participation. We are very grateful to our local Spar for providing water and fruit.

#### **Summer Scheme**

The Summer Scheme was once again offered to the children during July and August 2019. The scheme ran each day from 9.00am until 1.00pm. The children got a full range of planned activities including Treasure Hunts, Bouncy Castles, Day Trips and Arts and Crafts. This club not only provided entertainment for our children but also facilitated a smooth transition for our new primary one children. This club was well attended each day with 27 children. The second week of Camp was a GAA Fun Week run in conjunction with Down GAA. The children were coached by Down GAA coaches in a fun and interactive way. This Summer Scheme also allows the children who are due to start St.Mary's in P1 the opportunity to get to know the staff and become familiar with the school setting.

The extra curricular activities at St.Mary's, provided numerous benefits for our children enabling them to explore their physical, creative, and social interest as well as learning many new skills. Clubs included, our very popular Stay and Play club, Breakfast club, Soccer, Art, ICT, Construction, Dance and games. These activities enable our children to avail of an extended day from 8.00am until 4.00pm. The Board of Governors wishes to thank those staff who organised and/or provided these activities and the outside agencies who worked in partnership with the school to provide this programme.

#### **LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT**

The Board of Governors have met termly and have availed of training provided by EA.

The Governors have linked with teaching staff who have areas of reponsibility to support staff through the implementation of their action plan and to further develop the partnership between governors and staff.

Throughout the year the literacy coordinator, SENCO and Designated Child Protection teacher disseminated effective practice to other schools.

The Chair, Principal and coordinators have worked closely to develop comprehensive systems for the monitoring and evaluation of learning within the school.

#### **OPEN MORNING**

An 'Open Morning' took place in St.Mary's Primary School on Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> December at 10am. It proved to be an invaluable opportunity for prospective parents to see first hand the facilities and experience the wonderful atmosphere which exists in the primary school. From this 5 applications were received for PI admission in September 2019. An induction morning was held for these children on Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> June.

#### PARENT-TEACHER MEETINGS.

Parent-Teacher consultations were held in October 2018. A detailed report was issued to parents in June 2019. The school continues to regard this report and consultations as a vital part of good communication between the home and school. The school also encouraged parents to consult with teachers on a regular basis throughout the year and many parents availed of Numeracy workshops and Literacy workshops.

#### **PARENT- VOICE**

To further promote and develop communication Parent's Voice workshops were hosted. Through these opportunities key policies such as Welling Being, Relationships and Sexuality, Teaching for Learning and Anti- Bullying were discussed. The priorities in the School Development Plan were explained and parents were asked to outline experiences and opportunities that were going well in the school and areas for future development.

# **ENROLMENT AND ADMISSIONS**

# **BUILDING AND SECURITY ARRANGEMENTS**

The children and staff are kept safe on our school premises at all times. Exterior doors are kept locked and there is a buzzer system in place for visitors to the school. No vehicles are permitted to enter the school grounds during the school day.

All visitors to the school must report to the secretary's office and sign the visitors book. Children are collected from allocated destinations within the school. It is then the parent's responsibility to accompany their child(ren) home or to their car. Older children are allowed to walk home with parental permission a teacher accompanies older children to the top gate each day.

Leaks to the assembly hall roof were repaired and a broken handle on the staff room window was replaced.

The school continues to be maintained to the highest standards. This is a reflection of the respect and care shown by the children for their school and also of the high standard of care-taking in the school. The Board of Governors wishes to thank SEELB, Building Maintenance team for their commitment and hard work in ensuring that the premises in St Mary's are maintained to high standards.

#### LMS BUDGET REPORT.

The Finance Committee of the Board of Governors administered a delegated budget of £331,462.00. At the end of the 2018/19 financial year there was a surplus of £1,000.00.

#### **SCHOOL FUNDS**

The school also operated a school fund account for incidental expenses and immediate requirements. The major fundraisers were disco's and concerts which raised £3,500.00. The balance of school funds was £5200.00 on  $30^{th}$  June 2018.
